Darryl and Karen Anderson of Andalusia were presented the 2015 Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom (IAITC) Volunteer of the Year award during Illinois Farm Bureau's annual meeting in Chicago Dec. 5-8.

Darryl and Karen Anderson, who retired from teaching at Edison Junior High and Moline High School, respectively, have been involved with the Rock Island County Farm Bureau Agriculture in the Classroom program for more than 15 years. Karen serves as secretary-treasurer for the Quad Cities area Meat Goes to School program, coordinating funds for the 3,500 middle and high school students who participate annually.

Both Darryl and Karen have recruited volunteers and trained presenters for the county's annual AgXPerience program. Both have completed the Rock Island County Farm Bureau's Summer Ag Institute, which helps instruct teachers about new developments in agriculture. Karen is a member of the Teacher Advisory Council and Darryl welcomes students to AgXPerience each day during the three-day event.

The Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom Volunteer of the Year award recognizes county volunteers who have done an outstanding job with Agriculture in the Classroom and agriculture literacy efforts. Since 1983, 81 individuals have been recognized for contributions to agriculture

## Young Leader Social 6:30 pm at Brickhouse Pizza in Reynolds; RSVP to RICFB's beginnings

Picture rural life in the early years of the 20th century. Houses were heated by wood or coal. Water had to be pumped by hand for both people and livestock. Mother cooked on a woodfired cookstove and lit the kerosene lantern for light. You may or may not have had a telephone. The outhouse was out in the back of the yard. Going to town might be a once-a-week event by horse and wagon over dirt roads. Horses provided the power for plowing

and planting.

However, the world was changing. With the introduction of the Ford Model T in 1908, automobiles started to become available and affordable for middle-class Americans. In 1902, two engineers invented a tractor powered by an internal combustion engine and farm mechanization began. Henry Ford also got into the tractor business in 1917 with the Fordson tractor. With its light weight -- only one ton -- and low cost it soon dominated tractor sales.

Science also focused attention on improved methods of farming. The Smith-Lever Act of 1914 established the Cooperative Extension Service that provided educational programs for rural Americans about advances in agricultural practices and technology. Monetary funds and county agents were available to counties that organized farmers so that information could be shared.

On Jan. 25, 1916, the Rock Island Farm Bureau was formed, although its first name was the Rock Island County Agricultural League. The league changed its name to the Rock Island County Farm Bureau in 1919. The organizers of the Rock Island Farm Bureau held three early meetings which they devoted to perfecting the framework of the organization.

The organizers envisioned a place where farmers could join their efforts, share their ideas and solve mutual problems, as well as protect their interests in Washington, D.C. The Illinois Agricultural Association also formed in 1916 with a few early county Farm Bureaus forming the core of the organization. The first order of business for Rock Island County Farm Bureau was to secure a Farm Advisor. This person had to be approved by the Committee on Farm Advisors at the University of Illinois, must have actual farm experience, be a graduate of an Agricultural College, and have five years of successful agricultural experience following graduation. The Farm Bureau president, Sam Woodburn, appeared before the County Board of Supervisors and secured office space for the organization in the courthouse and an appropriation of \$1,000 per year for three years to secure the services of a Farm Advisor. P.R. Edgerton of Marion, Ind., was selected from seven candidates as the first Farm Advisor.

- Rock Island County native Tara Yoder of Knox County was named the Young Leader discussion meet winner at the annual meeting of the Illinois Farm Bureau in Chicago on Dec. 5-8.
